LOCAL HISTORY

The Wauconda Area has a rich history of many legacy families still residing in the area, not to mention the summertime memories from Chicagoland residents that many look back upon fondly. The Library maintains a digital history collection with over 2,500 historic images. These images can aid you in your genealogical research, help you remember the Wauconda Area of yesteryear, and are simply a lot of fun to peruse.

This collection was made possible by long-time Wauconda resident Neville Carr, who has made it his mission to borrow and scan over 2,500 photographs from dozens of the Wauconda Area's oldest residents and their families, and to gather information about each photo "before it's too late." He created an archival digital image of each photo, providing captions with names and anecdotal information whenever possible.
